The Joy of Singing

TEXT: Psalm 146:1-2 INTRODUCTION:

- A. AN IMPORTANT ELEMENT OF OUR WORSHIP IS SINGING PRAISES.
- B. OLD TESTAMENT CHARACTERS DELIGHTED IN SINGING (Psa. 146:1-2).
- C. A UNIQUE EXPRESSION OF JOY(James 5:13).
- D. HAVE WE LOST THE JOY OF SINGING?
 - 1. Many Christians sing with virtually no emotion or don't sing at all.
 - 2. We used to have "valley-wide" singings. What happened?
- E. WHY DO SUCH CONDITIONS EXIST? MAY BE A FAILURE TO:
 - 1. Appreciate the true purpose of singing.
 - 2. Know how we can get more out of singing.

I. THE PURPOSE OF SINGING.

- A. TO PRAISE THE LORD(Acts 16:25).
 - 1. This is the most popular concept of the purpose of singing.
 - a. Indeed, this is certainly the idea inherent in the word "HYMN"
 - b. From the Greek, HUMNOS, meaning "a song in praise of"
 - 2. Praising God should be a natural for Christians!
 - a. David reacted this way to the God's blessings(Psa. 28:6-7).
 - b. How much more should we!
 - 3. As "priests" we offer "sacrifices acceptable to God" (1 Pet. 2:5).
 - a. Singing is a "spiritual sacrifices" that we offer to God(Heb. 13:15).
 - b. Might we offer defiled service to God? (Mal. 1:7-8, 12-13).
- B. TO TEACH AND ADMONISH ONE ANOTHER (Col. 3:16; Eph. 5:19).
 - 1. Teaching and admonishing us to live properly, enjoying our blessings.
 - 2. Congregational singing" is "congregational teaching!"
 - 3. Singing is a way we can encourage our brethren and ourselves as well!

II. GETTING MORE OUT OF OUR SINGING.

- A. WE MUST ENGAGE THE "INTELLECT" AS WE SING
 - 1. Remember, singing is "teaching and admonishing one another."
 - a. This assumes that we **UNDERSTAND** what we sing(1 Cor. 14:15).
 - b. Not just for the entertainment or pleasure of the sound.
 - Therefore, give careful attention to the **WORDS** of the song
- B. WE MUST ALSO ENGAGE THE "EMOTIONS" AS WE SING.
 - 1. When we sing, we must do so...
 - a. "with grace in our hearts" (Col. 3:16).
 - b. "making melody in your heart" (Eph. 5:19).
 - 2. To sing without **EMOTION** (without grace in our hearts)...
 - a. Will be evident in our countenances! (Prov. 15:13).
 - b. Is hypocritical, and condemned by Jesus! (Matt. 15:7-8).

III. QUESTIONS TO EVALUATE YOUR SINGING.

- A. DO YOU LIMIT THE SPHERE OF YOUR SINGING?
 - 1. Is your singing limited to the assemblies? Do you sing alone, or with others?
 - 2. Singing ought to be spontaneous, arising when circumstances call for it (Acts 16:25; Psa. 34:1-3).

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B. IS THERE LACK OF EMOTION IN YOUR SINGING?

- 1. As in all that we do for the Lord, with "all" our hearts! (Matt. 22:37).
- 2. We should not praise the Lord "half-heartedly." Remember (Matt. 15:7-9).
- 3. We all can and should bless the Lord with their "whole being"! (Psa. 103:1).

C. DO YOU UNDERSTAND WHAT YOU ARE SINGING?

- 1. Some songs can be so complicated as to hinder understanding.
 - a. Pace of the song can be so fast we don't absorb the meaning of words.
 - b. The words may be unusual and not understood by the average singer.
- 3. Song leaders can help by being careful in the songs they select to lead
 - a. Carefully introducing songs that may be new to the congregation.
 - b. Taking time to explain the meaning of the song or unusual words in it.
- 4. The ultimate responsibility falls on us who sing

D. DO YOU STRESS MUSICAL HARMONY TO THE DETRIMENT OF NEW TESTAMENT SINGING?

- 1. God stresses making melody in our hearts over with our voices
- 2. The emphasis should be on praising God in heart and mind, and not how it may sound to the human ear!
